HAZCOM HELPER—OSHA VERSION COMPLIANCE TOOL FOR OSHA RULE 29 CFR 1910.1200

Objective

Develop tools that companies can use to comply with 29 CFR 1910.1200.

Background


Occupational Safety and Health Ad ministration (OSHA) rule 29 CFR 1910.1200 (also known as the Hazard Communication Standard) requires all employers having hazardous chemicals in their workplaces to develop a written hazard communication program. Employers must list all these chemicals and describe how the company will add ress requirements to (1) label containers used to store hazardous chemicals, (2) obtain or develop Material Safety Data—Sheets (MSDS) for hazardous chemicals, (3) provide potentially exposed workers with information about and training in working around hazardous chemicals, and (4) provide appropriate protective measures.

Approach

NIOSH pe rsonnel developed t he HazCom Hel per—MSHA Version to help mining companies write their HazCom documents as required by 30 CFR Part 47. Following many requests for the HazCom Helper from companies regulated by OSHA, NIOSH revised the program to create the HazCom Helper—OSHA Version to be more compatible with the specific needs of these nonmining companies.

This software lead s the person responsible for writing a Haz-Com plan st ep-by-step t hrough i ts prepa ration. Pr ompts and suggestions are provided to help the writer fill in the proper information. The Help menu is also useful. Appendix A assists with writing a list of all hazardous chemicals at a site. The program can be saved and recalled at any time so it can be updated whenever necessary.
