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evaluation, 1 our SEC business and our TBD 2 except for two issues on the TBD which relate to the utility tunnels at Linde. 3 4 I want to just remind people that 5 these issues are only pertinent during the SEC 6 periods and affect only those workers who 7 would not be covered under the SECs. At our last 8 face-to-face meeting, which was on 9 January 30th, and then on our teleconference

10 on February 15th, we dealt with these two 11 issues.

And basically, they were: what dates were the various utilities tunnels built and how much time did the workers spend in these tunnels? And this would be important for the dose reconstruction.

because 17 And it's important different areas at Linde have different levels 18 19 of radiation exposure and radioactivity. The 20 Work Group, SC&A, and NIOSH came to an agreement on the dates on the construction of 21 22 the tunnels after the January 30th meeting,

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and then we continued that discussion on February 15th.

viewed detailed 3 We had very 4 construction diagrams and other information at 5 that face-to-face meeting. However, we wanted to go one step further and see if we could б 7 resolve some discrepancy between what we had concluded were the dates of construction and 8 some worker testimony. 9

So we thought the best way to do this was to try to convene as many workers as possible, show them the same diagrams that we had been looking at and working from, and then have some discussion about them.

15 We thought that it would also be a good time to get some firsthand information on 16 time that workers of various categories might 17 have spent in the tunnels. So on April 30th, 18 19 in Buffalo, we had this information meeting. 20 We really appreciate the efforts of Mark Lewis and Mary Elliott from ATL for 21 22 arranging this meeting, getting the workers

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together, and they also prepared minutes from the meeting.

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3 the Everyone who was present at 4 meeting, I believe, has had access the to 5 minutes. I went over them and I thought they 6 did a very good job on that and it's nice to 7 have a summary of what we discussed.

8 At the meeting, we were able to clarify what we earlier thought was, you know, 9 10 because of the worker testimony, we thought a discrepancy about 11 there was the tunnel 12 construction dates, and then we spent a lot of 13 time talking about that, and I think the discrepancy that we had thought existed really 14 15 doesn't exist, but we'll go into that a little 16 more later.

Then we also came to an agreement on tunnel occupancy factors, and I've got that in the PowerPoint presentation. So that our goal for this meeting today is for the Work Group to agree on what we're going to present to the Board at the June meeting.

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And this will be, from what I can 1 2 tell from the agenda, during the regular Work 3 Group reports. So I thought it would be 4 helpful to put a draft together. So, with 5 Josie's help, Ι drafted PowerPoint а 6 presentation with the plan to use this, or 7 however we alter it, for this report.

8 So I think what the first thing we 9 should do today is decide whether we want to 10 go over these slides, I think, how many do we 11 have, about nine I think, one by one and look 12 them over, or since you've all seen them, we 13 could probably just state whether we have any 14 changes or comments.

15 plan then, once finalize My we 16 this presentation, would be that we will do this at the Work Group meeting -- I mean, at 17 the Board meeting in June, we'll 18 keep it 19 brief, since we're only on as a part of the 20 regular Work Group reports.

21 However, if anyone has any 22 questions, and this gets to be kind of a

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complicated situation because we're basing a lot of what our decisions were on those large looked diagrams that we've at at various meetings.

So we're asking Jim Neton, I think б we've asked Jim Neton this, to bring these 7 diagrams to the meeting in the event any Board 8 Members might have questions, then we could take a break, and we could look at them, and 10 answer any questions then.

with that, Jim or 11 So Josie, do 12 either one of you have any preference as to 13 how we proceed to look at this PowerPoint 14 presentation?

15 LOCKEY: MEMBER Gen, Ι had а 16 chance to go through it yesterday and today again, and I think it does reflect the meeting 17 had with the workers, 18 that we and it's 19 concise, and it essentially states what I feel are the facts based on the information we 20 currently have available. 21

> Okay. The brief CHAIR ROESSLER:

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part is something I tried to achieve. I had first had about five or six slides trying to talk about the time of the construction of the tunnels, and then without any hesitation at all, I borrowed the figure that Steve Ostrow presented in one of his reports, which is in color and outlines the various time periods.

8 And I thought that that one slide 9 would do what I was trying to do on a lot of 10 other slides.

MEMBER LOCKEY: And then we had an 11 discussion with 12 extensive the worker 13 representatives there about how much time the craft professionals spent in the tunnels, and 14 15 I think, as reflected in the slide, we decided 16 that 50 percent of the time was a reasonable 17 figure.

Also, a figure that's Claimantfriendly, but it's always hard to predict how much craft time is needed, but they're down they're down there doing the maintenance and construction and tear-down and things like

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everybody else.

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4 CHAIR ROESSLER: Thank you. And that's reflected in the last slide in the б PowerPoint.

7 MEMBER LOCKEY: Right. But we did 8 spend a lot of time talking about that at the meeting; how much time did they, overall, on 9 10 average, the time that they worked there during the spring, summer, fall, winter, how 11 12 within much, on average, was spent the 13 tunnels, either doing construction work, or 14 traveling, or retrofit work, or new 15 construction work, and I think the consensus 16 50 percent, and that seemed like was а 17 reasonable figure.

CHAIR ROESSLER: As I recall, it 18 19 seemed like we were zeroing in on 35 percent. 20 One of the workers had thought that was 21 pretty good and then when, Ι think, Jim mentioned 50 percent, everybody said, well, 22

2	MEMBER LOCKEY: Right.

16	think especially Antoinette, and the Board
17	Members, it would be very helpful for them to
18	have that.
19	MEMBER BEACH: Well, and I think
20	the workers involved should have a copy of
21	them also.
22	CHAIR ROESSLER: They do.

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I totally agree, though, if we're going to send these minutes to the rest of the Board, then they ought to be PA-cleared, they need to be shared with Antoinette and the workers as well, and we can do that.

8 It wasn't clear to us, since these 9 notes were really a convenience for the Board 10 Members, to what extent you want to rely on 11 these notes at all, since you were there 12 involved in that discussion.

13 And frankly, and to some extent, I mean, your involvement in that discussion was 14 15 important than the notetaking because more 16 there were a lot of parallel conversations 17 qoinq on at certain points which made it pretty difficult for the ATL person, Mary, to 18 19 do her notetaking for you.

CHAIR ROESSLER: Right.

21 MR. KATZ: But anyway, I will 22 certainly send that into the system. The

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1	version that we make public has to be PA^{-}
2	cleared, which means names have to be
3	redacted, and so on, but the participants who
4	were there at the meeting, of course, don't
5	need to get a PA-redacted version because they
6	were there listening to each other in the
7	first place.
8	CHAIR ROESSLER: So the workers
9	who were present could get a copy of it as is?
10	MR. KATZ: I think so. I'll have
11	to check that, but I don't see any reason why.
12	Maybe if Jen's on the line, she could tell
13	me.
14	MS. LIN: Ted, this is Jenny with
15	HHS OGC. Since those minutes were taken by a
16	federal agency and become part of our agency
17	records, in order to make them available to
18	the public, we would have to redact them,
19	regardless of whether the participants who
20	will be receiving them were actually aware of
21	the redacted names.
22	MR. KATZ: Wait, I'm sorry, so,
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Jen, I just want to understand. So I know we 1 2 have to redact them to make them publicly available, but for the participants, they have 3 4 to receive redacted versions even though they 5 were actually in the meeting? 6 That's correct, because MS. LIN: 7 that's not their record. Does that make 8 sense? 9 MR. Okay. Yes, I don't KATZ: 10 have a problem with -- the rules are the rules, so we'll get those redacted in terms of 11 12 names and distribute them. 13 CHAIR ROESSLER: So that would also apply to Antoinette then, even though she 14 15 participated. 16 MS. 4	interviewing them. I think we were just
5	discussing. I would say "discussions with" or
6	something along that line.
7	MR. KATZ: Yes. I mean, that's
8	fine. I mean, I also think that, you know,
9	that doesn't change the content in any way.
10	CHAIR ROESSLER: Yes, I think it
11	better reflects what our intent was.
12	MR. KATZ: Yes.
13	MEMBER LOCKEY: This is Jim
14	Lockey. As I remember, towards the end of the
15	meeting, we all sort of stood around and
16	talked among ourselves, and as a group, we had
17	said we've reached consensus here. Are these
18	maps truly reflective? Is this the history?
19	And are these figures reasonable figures in
20	relationship to the craft and non-craft people
21	in the tunnel?
22	And I think everybody who was
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there said yes to that. So that's my recall 1 2 and I think Gen and Josie will have to voice 3 with that what they thought, but I left that 4 meeting thinking that there was consensus. 5 MEMBER BEACH: Jim, Oh, Ι agree 6 with you. 4	some time looking at all the maps again
5	yesterday, and you can blow them up on your
6	computer, and some of the Board Members may
7	have interest in doing that.
8	CHAIR ROESSLER: I don't think
9	that should be a problem. Well, Jim would
10	probably have to answer that one.
11	DR. NETON: Yes, that will not be
12	a problem.
13	MEMBER BEACH: Well, and
14	especially the three that are involved here,
15	the early ones, you know, the 57 and 61. I
16	think if those three could go out, that way we
17	don't confuse, you know, the situation. I
18	think that would be important.
19	DR. NETON: So the original 37,
20	57, and 61 drawings?
21	MEMBER BEACH: Yes, or any of
22	them.

BONSIGNORE: That's correct, 13 and I spoke with a number of the workers after the meeting because it was very difficult for 14 Most of the time I 15 me to follow that meeting. 16 couldn't follow anything at all, and Ι so 17 spoke with some of the --ROESSLER: Antoinette, 18 CHAIR we 19 It turned out that we were going to broke up. 20 try and keep it all in one Group and then we began sort of one-on-one discussions, and I 21 22 tried several times to bring everybody

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together, but then I looked around and ²⁶ thought, you know, this is productive.

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Let's let them do this for a while 3 4 and then we'll come, all, back together, and we did, around the table, and at that point, 5 6 and I think this is reflected in the minutes, 7 what I tried to do is say, okay, here's what I think we've decided. I outlined it. 8 I qave 9 everybody a chance to respond, to object, and 10 I thought at that point we really did have items 11 consensus on these that we were 12 discussing.

13 BONSIGNORE: Right. MS. Well, that's what I'm trying to clarify here, Gen, 14 15 spoke with some of the workers is that, Ι 16 after the meeting, and they don't have any confidence in what the maps actually indicate. 17 the information 18 With respect to

19 that was imparted regarding the occupancy, 20 those were their statements, but with respect 21 to the actual maps that were presented, most 22 of the workers that I spoke with afterwards

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1	DR. NETON: Okay. Well, this is ²⁸ a
2	person that had previously provided an
3	affidavit. There are two affidavits out
4	there. The earlier affidavit was from a
5	gentleman who started work, I believe, in
6	1953, and he was at the meeting, and he was
7	the one worker there first of all, all the
8	workers agreed that none of them had been in
9	the 1957 constructed tunnels prior to 1957. I
10	think that was agreed.
11	CHAIR ROESSLER: Yes, it was.
12	MS. BONSIGNORE: Well, one of the
13	workers said he couldn't be sure anymore.
14	DR. NETON: Well, at the meeting I
15	can say that that's what he stated. Now, in
16	the 1961 tunnels, there was one worker who
17	said that he was in the tunnels between
18	junction boxes, I think, 6 and 8, which would
19	be the 1961 tunnels, prior to 1961. That's
20	what he said and that's consistent with his
21	affidavit.
22	MS. BONSIGNORE: Right. And then
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1	29 I think I know the worker that you're speaking
2	of, who was talking about whether he was in
3	the 1957 tunnel, what you're calling the 1957
4	tunnel, prior to 1957. When I spoke to him
5	after the meeting he felt as though he could
6	not, in good conscience, say definitively
7	whether or not.
8	He's not saying that he definitely
9	was or definitely wasn't. So again, I want to
10	be clear here that his statement is not being
11	misconstrued here. He is not agreeing with
12	you about the construction date of what you're
13	referring to as the 1957 tunnel. He's saying
14	that he simply, at this point, because it's
15	been over 40 years, cannot say definitively
16	whether he was in it or not.
17	CHAIR ROESSLER: Well, that's a
18	big change from what we had before at the
19	meeting, though.
20	MS. BONSIGNORE: Well, it's a
21	change, yes, but again, there is doubt. I
22	mean, I can make this argument now or I can
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make it at a later point. I mean, obviousl³⁰ the Work Group has come to a consensus on this. I disagree with your conclusion, and I will be making that argument to the Board for their final vote on this issue.

6 But I don't believe that there is 7 100 percent definitive proof that the tunnel 8 that ran between Buildings 30 and 31 was constructed in 1957. You have one worker who 9 10 says that he possibly could have been in it, 11 but he's not sure anymore, and you have 12 worker who submitted written another а 13 statement, a written affidavit saying that he was in that tunnel in, I believe, 1952 and 14 15 1953.

MEMBER BEACH: Antoinette, this is 16 17 Josie. Have you looked at the 1961 map? BONSIGNORE: Yes. Т 18 MS. have 19 looked at all the maps and that's the second 20 point that I'd like to get to. I feel as though this PowerPoint presentation doesn't 21 22 really explain anything about the maps. Ι

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mean, that one slide that was taken from the SC&A report is non-explanatory; I'm sorry to say.

4 Ι think if you're going to use 5 these maps as a justification to reduce the 6 amount of exposure for workers who are being 7 re-dosed and having their claims reevaluated 8 under the dose reconstruction, then there has to be greater explanation as to what all of 9 10 the maps say, what DCAS believes all the maps say, and what the Work Group believes all the 11 12 maps say.

This, to me, is insufficient. I'm sorry. It's simply not. You need to provide a detailed explanation as to why you believe the maps should be used to reduce the amount of exposure that will be assigned to these workers.

19 CHAIR ROESSLER: It seems then 20 that that's -- I guess the way I interpret the 21 Work Group's responsibility is that's what we 22 were to determine. That's why the Work Groups

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are established, to do this detailed work, and 1 2 then present our findings to the Board. If we take this whole explanation 3 4 to the Board, and we could, I suppose, take 5 all of those maps and everything, it's going to take several hours. I think it's sort of 6 7 going beyond or around what the Work Group was 8 assigned to do. Then perhaps it's 9 MS. BONSIGNORE: 10 a job for DCAS to do, to have something in writing, explaining what they believe each of 11 12 the maps that they have provided to the Work 13 Group, to myself, to some of the workers in 14 Buffalo who have viewed these maps, provide an 15 explanation as to what they believe each of 16 the maps represents, and how it supports their theory about the tunnel construction dates. 17 CHAIR ROESSLER: Well, I think we 18 19 need to ask this question of Jenny and Ted, 20 probably. First of all, I'm not sure that 21 there's going to be a vote on this. My understanding is it's a Work Group report, 22 **NEAL R. GROSS**

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this is the way the review of a TBD is handled, so that's one point.

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3 The other one is that, again, if 4 we follow the usual procedures, and I think 5 even gone beyond that here, the Work we've 6 evaluates the situation, Group comes to а 7 conclusion, says this is the way we see it, 8 and we move on from there. I don't know. We 9 need input, I think, from Ted and Jenny on --10 MS. BONSIGNORE: If I could just make one additional comment. I've spoken with 11 12 Dr. Melius about this and he agreed that there 13 would be a vote on this by the full Board on this 14 issue. So that's what he told me 15 personally. CHAIR ROESSLER: 16 Okay.

MS. BONSIGNORE: That was part of the agreement about having this meeting in Buffalo setup, having the workers agree to meet with NIOSH representatives, that there would be a full Board vote on this issue. That was the agreement.

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1	MEMBER LOCKEY: Gen, I think the
2	Work Group here can vote on presentation and
3	how the Work Group proceeds, when the tunnels
4	were constructed, and based on the totality of
5	the information that is currently available,
6	more likely than not a conclusion could be
7	reached. And then it's up to the Board to
8	decide whether they want to accept that or
9	not.
10	CHAIR ROESSLER: And then I think
11	too, the plan to actually go I still think
12	the plan to go with a very brief report, like
13	I've proposed, to the Board, but give the
14	option for the Board to look at the diagrams,
15	any Member of the Board, during break, to look
16	at the diagrams, discuss it with NIOSH, SC&A,
17	and Work Group Members, I think that would be
18	the most effective way to go about this.
19	MEMBER LOCKEY: I agree with that.
20	And I came away from the meeting in New York
21	thinking that I became more certain that
22	what was reflected on the construction
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diagrams was really, in fact, what was taking place.

is hard to go back 40 or 50 3 Ιt 4 years and figure out where somebody has worked 5 and what they did, and I have trouble with my 6 own memory, what I did 40 or 50 years ago. But 7 I think the majority of the evidence in this 8 is pretty persuasive that the case 9 construction maps pretty much reflected what 10 was going on at that site.

2	MR. KATZ: This is Ted. I just

4	One, the Linde agenda item is its own separate
5	agenda item now, from 9:30 to 10:00 on the
6	third day, that's June 21st, so it's no longer
7	tucked in with other Work Groups. So we made
8	it its own agenda item so that it would be
_	
9	very clear that this would be addressed here
10	for Antoinette and the workers' sake.
11	So when the agenda goes out, when
12	we have a final agenda to send out, that'll go
13	out, but at this point, at least, that's where
14	it's scheduled. Sometimes things get moved
15	around because of logistical problems with
16	different times and when people can
17	participate.
18	But in any event, so it's on there
19	for half an hour. That session does not have
20	a public comment section, but there's a public
21	we, on purpose, put it on Thursday also,
22	because Wednesday night, there's a public
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comment session when Antoinette would have an opportunity to make her comments.

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And Jim and I discussed this before, and this is how we wanted to handle it, so that she would have this comment period in advance of when the Linde matter is taken up by the Board.

It hasn't voted 12 13 on other TBD matters for other sites, but that doesn't mean the Board can't vote 14 on any 15 matter that's within its jurisdiction here, so 16 I don't have an issue with that whatsoever.

That's all I can tell you about that, but I trust if Antoinette said that there would be a Board vote, then there will be a Board vote. It was plain to me that it was to be an opportunity, at very minimum, for the Board to ask questions and discuss this

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MR. KATZ: Yes. Right. To address that, we have a break. We have another presentation after Linde, and then we have a break, and then the rest of that morning is Board work session.

CHAIR ROESSLER: Okay.

7 MR. KATZ: So, yes, there is sort 8 of some flexibility in there for the Board to further discuss, or to spend time looking at 9 10 I think I would encourage -- and when maps. we send out the materials, when I get the 11 12 materials from Jim, the maps, as well as the 13 Privacy Act-cleared notes that were taken in support of your meeting in Buffalo, when we 14 15 get those materials and send them out to the 16 Board, I think I would encourage them -- I 17 mean, we may be able to have Board Members, you know, have a look at those maps in advance 18 19 as opposed to doing it on the last day.

20 So we may work something out so 21 that they look at those either during a work 22 session, or on their own in the evenings, or

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they possibly could, so I don't really have any specific objections to that.

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3 Ι do have question However, а 4 about outstanding item that SC&A an was 5 supposed to be working on with respect to the 6 effluent issue and the injection wells. Ι 7 believe at one of the last official Work Group 8 meetings, that they were supposed to be taking 9 a closer look at that issue, and some of the 10 memoranda from the 1940s, and I don't know if they've done that. 11

And I'd also like to ask Dr. Neton 12 a question about some of the documents that 13 retrieved 14 were from the New York State 15 archives dealing with the effluent issue and 16 whether I can get copies of those documents, or whether the Congressional offices can get 17 copies of those documents, in advance of the 18 19 next Board meeting.

20 I've identified some of the 21 documents from the archive list that were sent 22 to Senator Schumer, Senator Gillibrand, and

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Congressman Higgins last month, and there are some documents from 1944-1946 dealing with the discharge of Linde effluents into the site wells.

5 And I'd like to be able to review 6 those documents in advance of the Board 7 meeting if possible.

8 CHAIR ROESSLER: Well, I think we should take care of that today. Probably the 9 10 first thing is, I didn't have this on my list issues, but the effluent issue, and you 11 of 12 first asked if SC&A had a response there, 13 Steve, do you have anything on that?

14 DR. OSTROW: Gen, we weren't tasked to look at that. 15 I'm looking at my 16 now, we're talking from the Buffalo notes, 17 gathering that we had, and my notes from that says that NIOSH is going to look at data about 18 19 ground contamination from the '40s, injection well overflow, to determine if it's important 20 radiologically whether that portion of 21 the tunnel existed before 1961. 22

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near the ceramics buildings, Buildings 30 and 31.

reading 3 And from of some mγ 4 memorandum about those injection wells, and 5 overflowing, and becoming how they were 6 clogged, and how the effluent overflow needed 7 to be diverted from the injection wells near the ceramics buildings to the injection wells 8 near Building 14 and Building 8. 9

So my question was, how did they get that effluent overflow, how did they diver it to the injection wells from one end of the site to the other? That was the question.

DR. NETON: Right.

15 BONSIGNORE: So when we were MS. 16 whether that section talking about of the between Buildings 17 tunnel running 30 and 31 prior 1957, that's 18 existed to why it's 19 relevant, because NIOSH now, the Work Group is 20 saying that that section of the tunnel was constructed in 1957. 21

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I am saying, and the workers are

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1	saying, that there is a possibility that that
2	section of the tunnel existed, that it was
3	actually there in the 1940s, and that's how
4	the effluent overflow was diverted from the
5	ceramics injection wells to the injection
6	wells that were located Building 14 and
7	Building 8.
8	DR. NETON: Okay. This is Jim. I
9	can talk a little bit about that. Well, the
10	'57 tunnels were the short little pieces
11	between Building 30 and 31, but there was also

12 that 1961 tunnel which actually went the 13 length of the site over towards Building 8.

That one, at least by your last email, seemed to indicate that you agreed that it could have been built in 1961. I'm not sure where your position is now.

18 MS. BONSIGNORE: Yes, that's 19 correct. The issue I have is the section of 20 the tunnel between Buildings 30 and 31.

21 DR. NETON: Well, those are 22 nowhere near -- the one that would have to be

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in place would be the 1961 tunnel because that 1 2 is the one that connected Building 30 and 31 over to Building 8. I mean, if that tunnel is 3 4 not there, there's no flow. It would have either gone through 5 6 trestles or additional piping. There's some 7 memoranda that we've that run across 8 specifically stated that no process effluent ever ran through the tunnels. 9 It was all 10 support, you know, of electrical cables, water supplies, that sort of thing. 11 So the 1961 tunnel, if it wasn't 12 13 there, you couldn't have gotten through the tunnels from Building 31 over to Plant 8. 14 15 It's not possible using the tunnels. 16 MS. BONSIGNORE: Can we get copies of the documents that you retrieved dealing 17 with the effluents --18 19 DR. Actually, the NETON: 20 documents that I retrieved, interestingly, you sent an email on April 17th, which was, I 21 22 believe, after I was at the archive, and you NEAL R. 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1	50 the tunnels could not have carried the
2	effluent if that 1961 tunnel was not there.
3	It's just not possible. It wasn't there. The
4	effluent injection program stopped, I believe,
5	in the late-1940s; maybe 1949.
6	MS. BONSIGNORE: Okay. And that's
7	the section of the tunnel that one of the
8	workers says that he was in.
9	DR. NETON: That's the one that
10	the first original affidavit said, and he's
11	the only one that I know of that says he was
12	in there prior to 1961, yes.
13	MS. BONSIGNORE: Okay.
14	(Simultaneous speaking.)
15	MS. BONSIGNORE: And he reiterated
16	that at the meeting in Buffalo.
17	DR. NETON: Right, but I think the
18	drawing is pretty conclusive as well as the
19	supplemental newspaper article that we found
20	that indicated that a building permit was
21	issued to install those tunnels in 1961. So
22	that's additional evidence.
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you to find that or maybe we could just handle that offline?

4 MS. BONSIGNORE: Yes. I mean, I 5 can look for it and send it. I mean, the 6 point being that I don't think this is an 7 issue that has been looked at enough. We're 8 getting one perspective on this issue from DCAS and I don't feel as though we're getting 9 10 enough of a proper evaluation of this issue about the pipe tunnels and about what those 11 12 memoranda say.

13 DR. This is Steve. OSTROW: We 14 had, of course, read the memoranda that was 15 sent and I didn't find them terribly relevant, 16 We've read before for years that you know? everybody knew the effluent overflow that went 17 from one part of the plant to the other, but 18 19 these documents don't make conclusion any 20 about whether they went through pipe tunnels or not, anything is just a surmise. 21

Looking at them again is not going

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to change that opinion. You know, these documents don't say, "therefore, the effluent went through a pipe tunnel." Looking at them again is not going to add new information, I don't think.

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This is like competing points of view here that, you know, if you look at the documents more you're going to come up with a different point of view.

CHAIR ROESSLER: Okay.

11 MEMBER BEACH: This is Josie, Ι 12 tend to agree with that. I think we need to 13 present what we have, what we've looked at, 14 and, I mean, I know as a Work Group, we have 15 tried and looked at all aspects, and it's 16 really hard, if you look at the 1961 map, and 17 the notes, and you look at the newspaper article from that date, it's very hard to say 18 19 that those tunnels were built any earlier than 20 1961.

21 And we have looked and we have 22 tried to find evidence. And it's very

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difficult because we do have one worker that says that he doesn't agree, so this isn't made lightly.

MEMBER LOCKEY: No. At the same time, we have looked, Jim Lockey, we have looked very hard and I've talked to thousands of workers in my profession, and when you go back 30 or 40 or 50 years, times get changed, times get muddled, not purposely, but that's just what happens.

So objective 11 when you have 12 documentation that's pretty persistent and you 13 have other workers that are pretty persistent about what the thought process is, then the 14 15 predominance of the evidence in this case was 16 that those maps are correct.

17 CHAIR ROESSLER: Yes. And I think 18 the one worker who, after our meeting, as 19 Antoinette said, changed his mind. He really, 20 the way I take it, he says that was so long 21 ago he can't say for sure.
