7	really is just an update meeting. And part of
8	the reason we moved this to a phone call was
9	that things are still in progress.
10	So it wasn't really we didn't
11	think it'd be fruitful to have a meeting in
12	Cincinnati. But it is at least worthwhile in
13	updating everyone on some activities that have
14	been going on.
15	And basically the meeting is a
16	summary of the October on-site visit to the
17	Denver Records Center, establishing NIOSH's
18	review of the documents located at LANL, the
19	status of ongoing NIOSH review of tritium and
20	thorium, SC&A's review of neptunium issues.
21	And then we'll have a chance for comments.
22	And we'll mention, you know, our
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meeting, a number of former employees spoke 6 about potential exposures to tritium, other radionuclides, and prompted additional actions by NIOSH, the Work Group, and the Board's technical contractor.

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we conducted a classified б NIOSH, 7 data capture Los Alamos in November. at 8 Documents were sent from Rocky to LANL. 9 During the decommissioning of the Rocky Flats 10 plant, the search focused on documents that supported the potential for tritium exposure 11 12 during the 1960s and early 1970s, prior to the 1973 incident. 13

14 Additionally, the search included 15 associated with neptunium documents and thorium activities. The status of that data 16 17 capture is that documents are still being 18 reviewed by DOE to release to Germantown for 19 further NIOSH and Advisory Board review.

Approximately one third of the documents have been released. And the rest are still being reviewed. And I know that Joe

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1	got a chance to get over and look at the one
2	7 third, or the documents that have been
3	released to Germantown. And he has gotten
4	over, and at least got a glance at those.
5	And then, as Mark may have
6	mentioned, I'm not sure, in November, a number
7	of us, including Mark, Joe Fitzgerald, myself,
8	and a couple of ORAU team members, we
9	conducted classified interviews with former
10	employees at the Denver Federal Records
11	Center.
12	The interviews were set up to
13	allow production workers, managers, health and
14	safety personnel, other employees, to speak
15	freely, without the concern of saying
16	something that should not be said in a public
17	forum. Our focus again was to identify
18	potential for tritium exposure during the
19	'60s, 1960s and early '70s, prior to the 1973
20	incident.
21	Additionally, interviewees were
22	asked questions concerning neptunium and
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1	associated with production and shipping and 9
2	receiving. Specific information given by an
3	individual of a production scenario where
4	tritium could be released, as well as specific
5	information about actions taken post-1973
6	incident, where we had indication of shipping
7	containers being contaminated with tritium.
8	So we did get additional
9	information from those interviews. Again,

information from those interviews. Again, those will be, we hope to have those approved by the interviewees and released here very soon. Additionally, to clarify, or also to --CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: LaVon.

MR. RUTHERFORD: Yes, go ahead.

15 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: This is Mark. 16 I just wondered, one question on your write-17 ups of the interviews. These were kind of, 18 you know, jointly conducted interviews with 19 SC&A, you know, with Joe.

I was in the room but, you know, at least SC&A and NIOSH were doing the questioning. Do you incorporate, or did SC&A

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1	And I wondered, when you say you
2	12 would release them, to whom would they be
3	released? Would they be released to me as a
4	committee Member? Would they be released to
5	the public? I'm not sure the nature of what a
6	release would be in a classified interview.
7	MR. RUTHERFORD: Yes, actually
8	thanks, Dave. The classified interviews have
9	been reviewed by DOE and, you know, any
10	information that would have been considered
11	classified has been redacted from those
12	interviews, and so they can be released to the
13	Work Group.
14	In addition to the classified
15	release, in order to release them to the
16	public, we will have to have a PII and
17	redaction done as well.
18	MEMBER KOTELCHUCK: Okay. Thank
19	you.
20	MR. RUTHERFORD: But again, I will
21	get them to Mark and Joe as quickly as we can.
22	Because you guys were involved in those
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1	interviews ahead of time.
2	13 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: And ultimately,
3	you will do the PII review, and have them
4	released to the petitioners, and everyone can
5	have that?
6	MR. RUTHERFORD: That's correct.
7	And we'll get that done, like I said, as soon
8	as we get, you know, get approval from the
9	interviewees that, yes, we've captured
10	everything appropriately.
11	CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: Okay. Very
12	good.
13	MR. RUTHERFORD: Okay. So, again,
14	you know, we did get some information. I
15	didn't want to go into too much detail on that
16	from those interviews. But I did want to
17	point out the specific production scenario we
18	learned, or we got information on, and the
19	potential for contamination from shipping
20	receiving containers, from shipping
21	containers.
22	And that has driven a lot of our
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potential bubbler that was in the area during the '60s time period, prior to the '73 incident.

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5 classified interviews So the provided us information that allowed us б to 7 actually do specific search for а more additional information at LANL and the Denver 8 9 Records Center. The Denver -- we went back, 10 we sent specific search terms to the Denver Records Center. 11

And they followed up with a number 12 of documents, identified a list of documents. 13 14 From that we actually had, the ORAU team was 15 out last week or the week before. I can't reviewing those 16 remember. And documents, 17 actually it's been two weeks ago. Reviewing those documents, identify documents that they 18 19 wanted to capture.

The Denver Federal Records Center is working to release those documents now, that we identified. We also did, we also want

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the document names and such which they provide based on our search, and come to the conclusion that we're not going to get what we need there. So we will get that and make that determination.

10 The classified interviews also provided information about 11 us where the 12 tritium analysis would have been conducted, which is Building 123. We identified, we got 13 a number of names of individuals to interview. 14 15 We have conducted those interviews.

have a couple of people that 16 We 17 we're still trying to run down that are associated with that. But we have conducted a 18 19 large portion of those interviews.

20 Once they are complete and all the 21 interviews are typed up and reviewed by the 22 interviewees, they will be made available to

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interviews, we will determine whether this 18 (telephonic interference) tritium exposure is feasible.

4 And we think that we can get this 5 done relatively quickly. If LANL -- and it's б all dependent on LANL releasing the documents 7 that they currently have. If LANL releases the documents by early March, we think we can 8 make our decision the information 9 on available, whether it changes our position, 10 sometime in April. 11

12 That will, will either and we document this, and this is solely for the 13 14 tritium exposure portion of it. We'll either 15 document this -- if it changes our position we will document it and either a -- depending on 16 17 what's appropriate based on General Counsel's 18 recommendation, either an 83.14 recommending a 19 whichever's Class, an addendum, or 20 appropriate.

21 Or if we determine that it hasn't 22 changed our position we may provide a White

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1 Paper of what we've reviewed, what information 19 2 we found, and provide that to the Work Group. thorium is kind 3 And of, the 4 thorium strikes is а little bit behind 5 schedule compared to the tritium. If you remember, the thorium-strikes issue was not an б 7 issue that was brought up or evaluated in the petition initially. So it was identified by 8 SC&A in some of their review. 9 10 It was also identified, actually, during 11 by some of the public the public 12 sessions, some additional discussion. So we 13 have captured that issue as an issue that we 14 need to do further work on. We have done a 15 considerable portion of that work already with the data captures I mentioned earlier. 16 We're looking for additional information. 17 We have identified that we, 18 you 19 know, we do believe that there may have been 20 more thorium strikes than what were previously identified. We are looking for additional 21 information on those. 22

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1 We're looking at personal, any 20 2 personnel monitoring data that exists. We're also going to look at our current, or the dose 3 4 reconstruction approach that was previously if 5 identified, and determine it's still bounding based on what we've learned. б 7 do, you know, based We on our current schedule we believe that we can have 8 9 that issue to the Work Group in the form of a White Paper in May of this year. 10 We have moved along relatively quickly. 11 We do have interviews that we are 12 13 currently trying to set up associated with the 14 thorium strikes. And as we get closer on 15 those, I'll get that information to Joe and the rest of the Work Group, in case they want 16 17 to sit in on those. 18 CHAIRMAN GRIFFON: So, LaVon, just to be clear, you said probably get a White 19 20 Paper to the Work Group by May for the thorium strikes? 21 That's correct. 22 MR. 6	I think that is one of the most
7	important issues that needs to be resolved
8	because if the data that NIOSH is basing their
9	methodology on is faulty, falsified or, you
10	know, not up to scientific standards, then it
11	doesn't really matter what kind of equations
12	they come up with, because it's based on
13	faulty data. So that is one of the most
14	important issues to resolve, is what I think.
15	And just to clarify something.
16	The petition did include the thorium strikes
17	as one of the issues to qualify or to have the
18	SEC approved. But other than that, I
19	appreciate, you know, trying to get me and the
20	petitioners the documents in a timely matter
21	because, you know, it does take us a lot
22	longer, since we don't have all the science

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
