Pursuant to the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act of 2000 and 42 C.F.R. pt. 83, a petition was filed on behalf of workers from the Westinghouse Electric Corp., Bloomfield, New Jersey, to be added to the Special Exposure Cohort (SEC).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) evaluated the petition and presented its findings to the Advisory Board on Radiation and Worker Health (Board) on February 11, 2010. The Board considered the petition, and on March 8, 2010, I received the Board's recommendation concerning this petition. I have also received the deliberations, findings, and recommendations of the Director of NIOSH and the Director of CDC. Based on this information, I have designated the following class for addition to the SEC:

All Atomic Weapons Employer employees who worked at Westinghouse Electric Corp., Bloomfield, New Jersey, from August 13, 1942 through December 31, 1949, for a number of work days aggregating at least 250 work days, occurring either solely under this employment, or in combination with work days within the parameters established for one or more other classes of employees included in the Special Exposure Cohort.

### HHS Designation of Additional Members of the Special Exposure Cohort

under the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act of 2000

Designating a Class of Employees from

Westinghouse Electric Corp. Bloomfield, New Jersey



#### I. Designation

I, Kathleen Sebelius, Secretary of Health and Human Services, designate the class of employees defined in Section II of this report for addition to the Special Exposure Cohort (SEC), as authorized under the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act of 2000 (EEOICPA), 42 U.S.C. § 7384q.

#### II. Employee Class Definition

All Atomic Weapons Employer employees who worked at Westinghouse Electric Corp., Bloomfield, New Jersey, from August 13, 1942 through December 31, 1949, for a number of work days aggregating at least 250 work days, occurring either solely under this employment, or in combination with work days within the parameters established for one or more other classes of employees included in the Special Exposure Cohort

#### III. Designation Criteria and Recommendations

Pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 7384q, for the class defined in Section II of this report, the Secretary has determined, and the Advisory Board on Radiation and Worker Health (Board) has recommended, that

- (1) it is not feasible to estimate with sufficient accuracy the radiation dose that the class received: and
- (2) there is a reasonable likelihood that such radiation dose may have endangered the health of members of the class.

The SEC final rule states in 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(1) that it is feasible in two situations to estimate the radiation dose that the class received with sufficient accuracy. First, the rule states that radiation doses may be estimated with sufficient accuracy if NIOSH has established that it has access to sufficient information to estimate the maximum radiation dose for every type of cancer for which radiation doses are reconstructed that could have been incurred under plausible circumstances by any member of the class. Alternatively, radiation doses may be estimated with sufficient accuracy if NIOSH has established that it has access to sufficient information to estimate the radiation doses of members of the class more precisely than a maximum dose estimate.

The Board, pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 7384q, advised the Secretary to designate the class as an addition to the SEC in a letter received by the Secretary on March 8, 2010.

#### IV. Designation Findings

#### Feasibility of Estimating Radiation Doses with Sufficient Accuracy

The Secretary established the feasibility determination for the class of employees covered by this report based upon the findings summarized below.

- NIOSH lacks sufficient information, which includes biological monitoring data, air monitoring information, and process and radiological source information, to estimate with sufficient accuracy the potential internal and external exposures to uranium, thorium, and their respective progeny to which the proposed class may have been subjected.
- NIOSH finds that it is likely feasible to reconstruct occupational medical dose for Westinghouse Electric Corp., Bloomfield, New Jersey (WEC-NJ), workers with sufficient accuracy.
- Principal sources of internal and external radiation for members of the proposed class included exposures to uranium and thorium and their respective progeny. During their production of uranium and thorium metal, the main uranium processes employed at the facility included green salt production, uranium metal production, uranium metal powder production, pressing and sintering uranium metal powder, and the production of uranium metal buttons. It should be noted that when "green salt" is referred to at WEC-NJ, the reference is to potassium uranium pentafluoride (KUF<sub>5</sub>) and not to uranium tetrafluoride (UF<sub>4</sub>), which is more commonly referred to as "green salt."
- NIOSH has been unable to find any records of internal or external monitoring for WEC-NJ employees; this includes bioassay, air monitoring, dosimetry, and area radiation monitoring data. NIOSH concluded that it is not possible to determine the magnitude of any potentially unmonitored external or internal doses at WEC-NJ and therefore it cannot complete the dose reconstruction(s) related to this petition. NIOSH does not have access to sufficient information to estimate either the maximum radiation dose incurred by any member of the class or to estimate such radiation doses more precisely than a maximum dose estimate.
- Pursuant to 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(1), NIOSH determined that there is insufficient
  information to either: (1) estimate the maximum radiation dose, for every type of
  cancer for which radiation doses are reconstructed, that could have been
  incurred under plausible circumstances by any member of the class; or (2)
  estimate the radiation doses of members of the class more precisely than a
  maximum dose estimate.
- The Board concurred with the NIOSH evaluation and recommended the proposed class for addition to the SEC.
- Although NIOSH found that it is not possible to reconstruct radiation doses for the proposed class, NIOSH intends to use any internal and external monitoring

data that may become available (and that can be interpreted using existing NIOSH dose reconstruction processes or procedures) for an individual claim.

 NIOSH finds it is feasible to reconstruct occupational medical dose for this period. It is feasible to estimate, with sufficient accuracy, the occupational medical dose for the class of employees covered by this evaluation.

#### Health Endangerment

The Secretary established the health endangerment determination for the class of employees covered by this report based upon the findings summarized below.

- (1) Pursuant to 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(3), NIOSH established that there is a reasonable likelihood that such radiation doses may have endangered the health of members of the class. Pursuant to 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(3)(ii), NIOSH specified a minimum duration of employment to satisfy this health endangerment criterion as "having been employed for a number of work days aggregating at least 250 work days within the parameters established for this class or in combination with work days within the parameters (excluding aggregate work day requirements) established for one or more other classes of employees in the Cohort."
- (2) NIOSH did not identify any evidence from the petitioners or from other resources that would establish that the class was exposed to radiation during a discrete incident likely to have involved exceptionally high-level exposures, such as a nuclear criticality incident, as defined under 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(3)(i).
- (3) The Board concurred with NIOSH's finding that the health of the class may have been endangered and defined the class according to the 250-work day requirement specified under 42 C.F.R. § 83.13(c)(3)(ii).
- V. Effect and Effective Date of Designation

The Secretary submits this report on the designation of one additional class to the SEC for review by Congress, pursuant to 42 U.S.C. §§ 7384/(14)(C)(ii) and 7384q(c)(2)(A), as amended by the Ronald W. Reagan National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2005, Pub. L. No. 108-375 (codified as amended in scattered sections of 42 U.S.C.). Pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 7384/(14)(C)(ii), as amended by the Ronald W. Reagan National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2005, Pub. L. No. 108-375 (codified as amended in scattered sections of 42 U.S.C.), the designation in this report will become effective 30 days after the date of this report's submission to Congress "unless Congress otherwise provides."

### VI. Administrative Review of Designation

The health endangerment determination of the designation provided in this report may be subject to an administrative review within HHS, pursuant to 42 C.F.R. § 83.18(a). On the basis of such a review, if the Secretary decides to expand the class of employees covered by this designation, the Secretary would transmit a supplementary report to Congress providing the expanded employee class definition and the criteria and findings on which the decision was based.
